ANNEXURE 4 Information Paper 1: THE HOSPITAL TRANSFUSION COMMITTEE

Terms of Reference:

It is mandatory, as described in the National Blood Policy 2015, that all major hospitals providing blood transfusion should establish a hospital transfusion committee (HTC) as a local body that is able to support, monitor and ensure safe transfusion practice, for donors and patients and staff.

Roles:

The principal function of the hospital transfusion committee is to:

- 1. Monitor the safety, adequacy and reliability of the supply of blood, blood products and alternatives to transfusion
- 2. Develop systems and procedures for the implementation of the national guidelines on the clinical use of blood within the hospital, including the development of a hospital blood ordering schedule.
- 3. Promote the effective implementation of the national guidelines through the education and training of all clinical and blood bank staff involved in the transfusion process.
- 4. Monitor the usage of blood and blood products within the hospital
- 5. Monitor the implementation of the national guidelines in the hospital and take appropriate action to overcome any factors hindering their effective implementation
- 6. Review incidents of severe adverse reactions or errors associated with transfusion, identify any corrective action required and refer them to the National Blood Transfusion Committee.

Membership:

Should be multidisciplinary and involve all departments in the hospital that are providing and prescribing blood.

Include:

- senior representatives from specialties that prescribe blood
- OIC Blood Bank
- OIC Pathology
- A senior pharmacist
- A senior nurse

The membership of the HTC is primary clinical but on occasions may involve other personnel such as the finance officer or a lawyer.

Chair: Either Director Curative Health, Director Medical Services or a senior clinician.

Meetings: Can be held monthly or quarterly depending on hospital needs.

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
